


Total Cases Reported by Day











Shows percentage of ICU beds that are occupied.




Percent of confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Contra Costa by race versus county population by race. Includes recovered.

Percent of Cases by Ethnicity




Percent of confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Contra Costa by ethnicity versus county population by ethnicity. Includes recovered.


Total confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Contra Costa by age group. Includes recovered.


Deaths by Ethnicity

Who is Dying in Contra Costa County?





Deaths by Race







What Authority does the Health Officer have to Issue these Orders without Ratification by the Board of Supervisors?

California Health and Safety Code

§ 101040: The Health Officer may take any preventive measure that may be necessary to protect and preserve the public from any public health hazard during any "state of war emergency," "state of emergency," or "local emergency," as defined by Section 8558 of the Government Code, within his or her jurisdiction. "Preventive measure" means abatement, correction, removal, or any other protective step that may be taken against any public health hazard that is caused by a disaster and affects the public health.

§ 120175: Each health officer knowing or having reason to believe that any case of the diseases made reportable by regulation of the department, or any other contagious, infectious or communicable disease exists, or has recently existed, within the territory under his or her jurisdiction, shall take measures as may be necessary to prevent the spread of the disease or occurrence of additional cases.

Contra Costa County Applied for and Received a Variance to Move Faster Through State's Timeline



County variance

Stage 2 expansion will be phased in gradually. Some communities may move through Stage 2 faster if they are able to show greater progress. Counties that have met the readiness criteria and worked with the California Department of Public Health can open more workplaces as outlined on the County Variance page.

Indicators used by Bay Area Health Officers for Assessing Progress

- 1. Total Number of Cases, and Hospitalized Patients is Flat or Decreasing (Both doubling in the last month).
- 2. Sufficient Hospital Capacity. (Just under ½ of ICU Beds Available)
- 3. Sufficient COVID -19 Viral Tests Conducted (Yes).
- 4. Sufficient Contact Tracing & Isolation/Quarantine Capacity (Delay in test results, 90% Traced)
- 5. At least a 30-Day supply of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)(Yes).

Indicators used by the State to Determine if Should be on the *Watch/Monitoring List*

- COVID-positive case rate is greater than 100 per 100,000 population (We're at 109.6)
- Test positivity (7-day average) does not exceed 8% (Last week hit 8.2%, now 6.1%).
- Percent change in 3-day average COVID+
 hospitalized patients does not exceed 10%
 (Although spiked, from 32 a month ago to 93 now,
 recent increase below 10%).
- Percent of ICU beds currently available is not less than 20%. (121 of 264 Available).
- Percent of ventilators currently available is not less than 25%. (48 of 299 Available)

COVID19 in Congregate Care Facilities: Senior Living Facilities and Skilled Nursing

When there is an outbreak:

- County Health and/or one of our healthcare partners send a strike team to review infection control practices with facility staff.
- A mobile testing unit then goes to nursing homes and does on-site testing.
- Testing is done even before there is an outbreak
- County Health and partners are doing "surveillance" testing at skilled nursing and assisted living facilities, meaning we're testing staff and residents who are asymptomatic.





- Bookings per day dropped 84% typically 60 per day, were down to 10 per day, rising now
- What Offenders still being held:
 - 164 defendants facing murder charges
 - 98 facing child molestation charges
 - 22 charged with rape, 18 charged with kidnapping
 - 108 charged with robbery
 - 101 charged with burglary
 - 186 charged with assault with a deadly weapon







Actuarial Funding Status


Funded Ratio (Dollars in Thousands)








Revenue by Source





PRELIMINARY ENGINEERING

Alternatives that move forward into environmental analysis must fit within the physical constraints of the corridor, minimize impacts, and be financially feasible while still meeting the project's purpose.
